Cedar Unified School District Student Activities and Organizations

Young people in our school, Jeddito Elementary Public School, are part of the Cedar USD family – which means that students have the opportunity to participate in all extra-curricular programs, organizations, performances, and forums available that make the Cedar USD student life a richer experience.

In addition to fall, winter, spring sports programs, STUCO, tutoring, three new clubs have been added to enrich student academic development. These student clubs provide students with channels to address issues most relevant to them and offer opportunities to further develop their leadership skills. Student clubs invite speakers from companies and organizations, engage the community in awareness and service activities, and build connections that complement classroom learning. The new student clubs are:

Native American Studies Club - Native American Studies (NAS) Club offers students an opportunity for an in-depth approach to understanding the historical and contemporary experiences of Native American people. Attention is paid not only to the special relationship between tribes and the federal government, but to issues across national boundaries, including tribal nations within Canada, and North, Central, and South America. In using the term Native American, the NAS sponsor and club members will recognize the heterogeneous nature of this population. Native Americans include the Alaska Native population, which comprises Aleuts, Eskimo, and other Native American people residing in Alaska, as well as Native Hawaiian communities.

National Junior Honor Society - The National Junior Honor Society (NJHS) elevates a school's commitment to the values of scholarship, service, leadership, character, and citizenship. These five pillars have been associated with membership in the organization since its inception in 1929. Learn more about these five pillars of membership here. Today, it is estimated that more than one million students participate in NJHS activities. NJHS chapters are found in all 50 states, US Territories, and around the world. Chapter membership not only recognizes students for their accomplishments, but challenges them to develop further through active involvement in school activities and community service. - 375 pints of blood

Through NEHS, students provide meaningful service to the school and community and develop essential leadership skills.
